Roughly a month after taking the position of Vice President for Academic Affairs, I told our colleagues in a faculty-consensus workshop last September that "being a Catholic University," "to be a more internationalized university," and "the Fu Jen Catholic University (FJCU) Hospital" will hopefully in the near future become the hallmarks of Fu Jen distinct from other universities in Taiwan.

(i) Being a Catholic University, we emphasize the search for the common good, care for the weak and concern for the least, cooperation and solidarity. We would thus leverage our connections with other Catholic universities in the world to achieve global collaboration and to exert a stronger influence on our society. (ii) We should do our utmost to render Fu Jen much more internationalized by enhancing our faculty members' as well as our staff members' fluency in English in order for Fu Jen to compete globally, and, most importantly, to facilitate domestic students' international mobility and to recruit high-quality international students in the wake of low fertility rate in Taiwan for which the number of domestic high school graduates is dropping precipitously. (iii) The FJCU Hospital is probably the largest investment ever in Fu Jen's history and it should be at our disposal fully utilized as a "carrier" to lift Fu Jen up to a higher academic level.

Almost all of our departments may introduce or discover innovations by virtue of their collaboration with the FJCU Hospital, thus demonstrating their uniqueness that distinguishes from those at other universities. For example, the Department of Nutritional Science may well design the most nutritious meals for the patients in our hospital, while the Department of Physics may well start developing the interdisciplinary studies of biological and medical physics by collaborating with our hospital.

We currently embark on developing several interdisciplinary programs based on the axes of "health" and "design," first proposed by Prof. Shang-Chih Kung, Dean of Academic Affairs, by connecting fields among several colleges alongside the FJCU Hospital on the university level.

There are numerous tasks that need to get accomplished with dogged determination, such as reserving our summer break for a possible "third semester" in order to offer a greater degree of flexibility for domestic and international students to take courses at Fu Jen in summer, and granting students certificates attesting to the completion of some courses through rigorous evaluation, thus allowing students to earn credits and to be rewarded for skills learned outside the conventional classroom while involving in some meaningful extracurricular activities or service learning, among others.

Fu Jen needs some changes as we are looking towards the future and none of them is easy given the sheer size and diversity of specialty in our campus. However, I'm still quite optimistic about Fu Jen to have a better future despite a series of daunting challenges we're facing. Let me finally cite a paragraph from President Barack Obama's 2014 State of the Union Address to come to my conclusion – "But if we work together; if we summon what is best in us, with our feet planted firmly in today but our eyes cast towards tomorrow – I know it's within our reach." God bless Fu Jen.

Fu Jen cheerleaders excel in Asia Cheerleading Championship

Department of Physical Education student Kuan-Chun Liu (2nd year grad), Chia-Ni Yu (1st year grad), Shang-Jing Yeh (undergrad junior), and alumna Ke-Chung Wu recently participated in the intense 2015 1st Asian Cheerleading Dancesport Championship, representing the Chinese Taipei Cheerleading Association. Audience and teammates alike applauded their efforts as the students brought home several awards.

The 2015 1st Asian Cheerleading Dancesport Championship took place in the National Stadium, located in the heart of Bangkok, Thailand, November 15 - 16, 2015. Cheer Taiwan won the most prizes, with a total of six gold and two silver medals. The event, hosted by International Cheer Union and co-hosted by the Cheerleading Association of Thailand, featured an enthusiastic opening ceremony and the completion of eight competitions in the course of two days. Each of the contests was separated into different categories, including youth and open groups freestyle pom doubles, youth and the open groups freestyle pom team, hip-hop doubles, coed partner, and coed team.

Competing for Cheer Taiwan, the four Fu Jen representatives gave outstanding performances, and brought the crowd to their feet several times. Yu, Yeh and Wu entered open groups of cheer freestyle pom, and won a set of gold medals. Yeh and Wu entered open groups of freestyle pom doubles and, again, took home another set of gold medals. Liu entered the coed team of four competition, and won a silver medal.

This was the first time Thailand hosted an official cheerleading championship. In the past, the Thai team only participated. Liu said, "Competing in a championship is a huge deal. The competition was originally set for September. Due to the bomb attacks, however, it was postponed. Several other Asian countries were not able to make the competition, and not being able to compete with them was very unfortunate."

Yeh was overjoyed upon receiving her medal on stage. "Honestly, I wasn't feeling too bright. My legs were covered with wounds like a coat, but I wanted to finish what I started," she said. During the freestyle pom doubles, the other contestants were giving it their best shots, leaving their hearts out there in the open. I was so amazed and overwhelmed by what was happening, and surely wanted to do my best. And I did! My partner kept encouraging me. She is my biggest supporter, and wanted me to enjoy my moment."

Each of the team of nine for Cheer Taiwan came from different schools. The team lacked the most important dimension, time, to practice together, except on weekends. Many needed to travel long distances in order to be with the team. Cheer Taiwan was truly remarkable, however, and achieved yet another worthy milestone in their journey.

The Prince and Grand Master Fra' Matthew Festing was awarded the degree of honorary Doctor of Philosophy on November 5th, 2015 at Fu Jen Catholic University. Fra' Matthew Festing is the highest official in the Sovereign Military Order of Malta (SMOM), and as a head of state, carries a religious position as high as that of a cardinal. Many high-ranking officials, including the Director-General of European Affairs, Dr. Anna Kao, and Monsignor Paul Russell of the Apostolic Nunciature, personally witnessed the ceremony.

Fra' Matthew Festing was born in 1949, Northumberland, England, and graduated from St. John's College, Cambridge, where he studied Modern History. He is widely known in this field, and in art as well. A devout Catholic, he was admitted to the Sovereign Military Order of Malta (SMOM) in 1977, at which time he dedicated himself to an important role in encouraging world peace and medical care for the poor. He was elected in 2008 as the 79th Prince and Grand Master (tenure). With breadth of scope in his leadership and unstinting perseverance, he has since led humanitarian efforts world-wide, and deepened ties between countries.


His appreciation of a number of virtues, as well as his p ersonal selfless dedication, are a fitting match for Fu Jen's moral ideals and sense of human rights. He won high remarks from the Fu Jen Catholic University Committee for Honorary Doctoral Degrees.

SMOM enjoys a long history of sovereignty that dates back 900 years. SMOM has won worldwide recognition as a Catholic religious order. Since its origins, the order has aided patients in need of medical care during the time of the crusades, and to this day, through its international relief corps, assists homeless, refugees, and elderly in need, as well as victims of natural disasters, epidemics, and armed conflicts. SMOM has a total of 13,500 Knights, Dames and auxiliary members, and employs about 25,000 doctors, nurses, auxiliaries and paramedics, assisted by 80,000 volunteers in more than 120 countries.

Grand Master Fra' Matthew Festing introduced the order's influential history, with its full name, the Sovereign Military Hospitaler Order of Saint John of Jerusalem of Rhodes and of Malta. The Knights of the order are spread all over the world, including Asia, where search and rescue plans are carried out. Grand



Employers Top Choices: NTU and FJCU meets on top!

By Po-Sheng, Chiu CNA News reporter Employers Top Choices for Universities," a survey conducted by 1111 Job Bank, shows that National Taiwan University (NTU) and Fu Jen Catholic University (FJCU) surpassed National Cheng Kung University (NCKU), and were ranked first. The survey indicates employers' top choices among public and private universities in the nation.

What are the top universities for employability? According to the 1111 Job Bank survey, which jumped back into the spotlight, the top picks from public institutions, outranking fellow elite NCKU, were National Cheng Chi University (NCCU), National Chiao Tung University (NCTU), and National Tsing Hua University (NTHU).

Among private universities, the positions of winner and first runner up went to FJCU and Tamkang University (TKU), a swap in places compared to last year's. The second runner up spot goes to Chung Yuan Christian University (CYCU).


In order to evaluate the probability of acceptance of the nation's graduates, 1111 Job Bank piloted the survey "2015 Employers Top Choices for Universities." Vice President of 1111 Job Bank, Mr. Da-Hua Li said that compared to last year's survey results, the fluctuation in the ranking was not massive. Worth mentioning is the fact that science and technology studies, which used to be a favored academic field, has been over taken by an advance in comprehensive studies and linguistics.

According to the survey, the grounds for employers' preferences were the graduates' working attitudes (73.5%), followed by problem-solving abilities (37%), good communication skills (35.4%), speed of learning (29.9%), and adequate knowledge and skills in the area of expertise (28.7%).

In addition, the survey also shows that standards in the process of job interviews included candidates' ability to be proactive, followed by a sense of responsibility and self-management, and then the ability to handle reasoning and emotional management. This is a contrast with the traditional and dated notion of a grasp of professional knowledge, skills and practical application, which ended up in the ranking as in 9th and 10th places in the survey. The importance of having a prominent and positive working attitude has outperformed the obsolete performance based evaluation in the area of expertise.

Mr. Li said, considering the fact that acquiring a bachelor degree is the basic threshold of employment, and having an equally strong professional based knowledge, "soft skills" has become an essential, and ultimately, the key to making the hiring decision. Nonetheless, stress management and sense of responsibility are the missing traits in today's employment process. Compared with former years, a great gap exists in this category. Once the graduates understand and develop these two traits, competition may become lopsided, with applicants with these skills highlighted from the rest of the crowd. He suggested that graduates develop skills of being proactive to work against the stereotypical idea of low stress management and compatibility.

The "2015 Employers Top Choices for Universities," conducted by 1111 Job Bank, is a sampling survey focusing on managers, or others who have the ability to choose and utilize talented personnel. The survey was conducted between Nov. 2nd-30th, 2015, with a total of 3,396 valid questionnaires.


Performance Excellence
